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CARE: Child Adult Relationship Enhancement "Connecting with Children"

What to avoid when following the child's lead:

	Qs	EXAMPLES	REASON
Q	QUASH the need to lead! Avoid unnecessary commands	 Draw me a house. (Direct Command) How about you try it this way? (Indirect Command) 	 Directions and suggestions take the lead away from the child. Suggestions are often hidden directions, and the adult expects the child to comply. If a child doesn't follow the direction, it can cause bad feelings.
Q	Quit Unnecessary "Information" QUESTIONS Quit "Tone-of- voice" QUESTIONS	 What sound does the cow make? What are you building? Do you want to play with the train? How many brothers and sisters do you have? Child: I'm going to color the dog purple. Adult: You're coloring it purple? 	 Questions tend to lead the conversation. Many questions are commands and require an answer. It may seem like you aren't listening to the child. It may sound like you disagree with their idea.
Q	QUIET the criticisms: QUIT NO DON'T STOP NOT	 Quit being silly That wasn't nice. I don't like it when you make that face. Stop crying! No, you shouldn't do that. That animal doesn't go there. 	 "Negative talk" often increases negative behavior. It can also create friction.

Use the 4 Ps to follow the child's lead.

	The 4 Ps Examples		Reason
Ρ	PRAISE (Specific) appropriate behavior	 Good job sharing your toys with me. I'm so proud of you for staying calm. Nice job using your indoor voice. I like the way you used all different colors for your tower. Thank you for telling me about Iron Man. I love talking with you about the Avengers. 	 Specific praise lets the child know exactly what the adult likes. increases the likelihood that the behavior will occur again. adds more warmth to a relationship with a child. makes both the adult and child feel good!
Ρ	PARAPHRASE appropriate talk and expand the interaction when possible.	 Child: Iron man can fly. Adult: Iron man <u>can</u> fly. Thor is my favorite Avenger. His hammer helps him fly. Child: My shirt green. Adult: You are wearing a green shirt. Child: It's cold. Adult: The play-doh <u>does</u> feel cold. 	 Paraphrasing allows the child to lead the conversation shows the child you're really listening shows you accept and understand what they're saying models good language and communication skills improves and expands the child's language production
Ρ	POINT OUT the child's appropriate behaviors	 You're coloring the leaves orange. You put three piles together. We are putting all of the animals in the barn. We drove the cars into the garage. 	 Pointing out behavior lets the child lead lets the child know you're interested and paying attention lets the child know you approve of what they're doing models speech and teaches vocabulary and concepts keeps the child's attention on the task helps organize the child's thoughts
Ρ	PRACTICE Imitation	Child: (coloring castle gray) Adult: (colors castle gray on own paper) Child: (makes animals dance) Adult: I'm going to make my animals dance just like yours	 Practicing imitation lets the child lead increases cooperative play lets the child know you approve of what they're doing, building self-esteem
